





Kicking off a safe and healthy school year

It certainly has been a unique start to a new school year, one unlike any other most people have experienced. Across River East Transcona School Division, students and staff are adapting to being together—in socially distant and safe ways. Thanks to the considerable efforts by so many staff leading up to the start of the school year, the division's schools opened with safe, clean spaces and guidelines in place to protect students, staff, and the community in the face of the COVID-19 pandemic.

"Circumstances are changing, sometimes daily and the division, by working closely with Manitoba's Public Health team, is committed to fulfil our purpose—to educate students—in a safe way for everyone," said Jerry Sodomlak, board chair. "The board of trustees believes

it's important people are aware of what the division is doing to keep its students and staff safe, because that in turn protects the whole community."

Before the school year began, division staff was diligent in preparing schools for the return of students and school staff. Their efforts included deep cleaning, setting up hand sanitizing stations, placing signs for social distancing and reminders about handwashing, creating cohorts of students to minimize contacts among students and staff, and other steps to reduce the spread of disease.

Trustees also approved the purchase of seven new buses needed to allow eligible students to go to and from school on buses and follow

the Public Health directives that restricted and reduced the number of students we are allowed to put on a bus.

"We know it has not been all smooth sailing in every situation, but the division is working hard to help school administrators, staff, and students follow Public Health protocols to make our schools safe," commented board vice-chair Keith Morrison. "Keeping informed is one way we can stay safer and the community is encouraged to check the division's website for updates or go to the individual school sites for more local news."

Prince Edward School turns 100

A century ago, on October 20, 1920, Prince Edward School opened its doors for students in Grades 1 to 6. Its life began as a one-storey building, constructed at a cost of about \$60,000. Today, many of its kindergarten to Grade 5 students are among the second and third generation to attend the school.

The school community has lived through many historical times, including the current pandemic; however, since its inception Prince Edward School has focused on creating a strong sense of community among its students, staff, and families.

"Prince Edward School is more than just a building, it is a community hub that has positively shaped and empowered our students, staff, and community-at-large," said trustee Brianne Goertzen, a member of the planning committee and the mother of a current student. "Now more than ever we need to take time to recognize and celebrate this historic moment and the priceless contributions the school has made and continues to make to our community."

A centenary planning committee had worked hard to come up with many celebratory events. Although the pandemic has meant changing many of these activities, the committee has been innovative in finding socially distant ways to mark this significant milestone. These include a virtual tour of the school, an online guest book, a commemorative plaque, and student work showcasing the school's past and present. If talking to the teacher doesn't resolve the issue, talk to the principal.

If you disagree with the decision of the superintendent's department, you can make an appeal in writing to the board of trustees.
