Message from the Minister of Education

Dear Parents/Guardians and Families,

As I am sure that you have noticed, the use and popularity of e-cigarettes and "vaping" has been increasing in Manitoba. These trends come after years of decreasing smoking rates across the province, particularly among youth.

This trend is concerning as the use of e-cigarettes is not without risk, with evidence emerging around addiction potential and harmful chemicals contained in the vaping liquid. Therefore, as a province, we want to ensure we are being proactive and that tobacco use is not simply being replaced by e-cigarettes.

My office has provided a reminder to all schools that the use of e-cigarettes (as with conventional cigarettes) in any enclosed public space, including schools, is prohibited under The Smoking and Vapour Products Control Act. This prohibition is important to ensure that smoking, be it tobacco or e-cigarettes, is not normalized or thought of as a risk-free activity.

As e-cigarettes are a relatively new technology, we want to ensure that parents are also able to access clear and balanced information to be able to talk to their children. We know that nobody is more influential on a young person's decisions than their parents and would therefore like to encourage you to explore the resources available from

CONCERN PROTOCOL



IF YOU HAVE A CONCERN AT YOUR CHILD'S SCHOOL ...

Your child's school will always try to make the learning experience a positive, safe and happy one for its students. However, if you have a concern or an issue, please don't hesitate to let the school know. Open communication between home and school is very important to us. Here are the steps to follow:

- Talk to the person most directly involved—your child's teacher. If you must leave a message, please
 be sure to provide a day and evening phone number where you can be reached.
- 2. If talking to the teacher doesn't resolve the issue, talk to the principal.
- If you've talked to the principal and, over a period of time, the issue still has not been resolved, call
 the superintendents department at 204-667-7130 or email communications@retsd.mb.ca
- If you disagree with the decision of the superintendents department, you can make an appeal in writing to the board of trustees.

The RETSD Board of Trustees cares about the education of all the students in our division. We realize that issues may occur and wish to highlight that the above process must be followed if concerns are to be properly addressed. For more information:

Teachers are on recess duty and are not available for indoor supervision of sick children.


If your child is too sick to go out for recess it is best they are kept home.

News From the Library

Hello Gators! The past few months have been busy in our B.E. Glavin Library! We would like to thank you all for supporting our Scholastic Book Fair that we held during Student Led Conferences. It was so wonderful to see so many families and students going home with books to read, and we received a portion of our total sales back in books and resources for our library. What a wonderful way to celebrate our learning and literacy at B.E. Glavin!

We celebrated the Hour of Code at the beginning of December. The Hour of Code is held every year during Computer Science Education Week and it encourages all students to participate in an hour of coding to celebrate computer science. Our Grades 1 to 3 students coded using coding mice, and our Grades 4 to 5 students coded using Dot and Dash robots. The workshops were held in the library by the WISE Kidnetic Energy Program through the University of Manitoba. It was amazing to see the problem-solving and teamwork skills the students used as they were engaged in coding their devices!

Mrs. Buchanan worked together with Mrs. Brett's 4/5 and Mrs. Lamoureux's Grade 4 classes on an animal adaptation and habitat research project. We learned about the diverse habitats in Manitoba, and each student picked an animal to research. The students used laptops, iPads, books, movies, a field trip to Oak Hammock Marsh and a presentation from the Wildlife Rehabilitation Centre to research their animal, their animal's habitat, their animal's unique adaptations, the food chain their animal is in and the ways in which human's have impacted their animal. They demonstrated their learning by creating beautiful dioramas to showcase their knowledge.

All three Kindergarten classes have been working co-operatively to transform our Imagination Station into SANTA-LAND!






SANTA-LAND must have a drive-thru restaurant, complete with menus, employees, signs and Cashiers.

This term, the grade 5 students have had the opportunity to connect their learning of social, emotional and physical wellness through outings provided by the True North Youth Foundation & Project 11.


Project 11 is an initiative that focuses on mental wellness, and offers students strategies to connect to their own physical, social, and emotional wellness.

Sometimes, severe weather requires us to make changes to busing, outdoor recess, and safety patrolling

Busing

to keep your children safe.

When the temperature or wind chill is -45C or colder at The Forks, metro Winnipeg school divisions (RETSD included) cancel buses for the entire day—but schools usually remain open.

We will post a cancellation alert on the RETSD website home page if buses are cancelled, and alert the media. If we have not posted a cancellation alert by 6:45 a.m., buses are running.

Indoor Recess

When the temperature or wind chill is between -25°C and -27°C, a shortened recess period may be warranted. When it is below -27°C, recess is usually moved indoors. This is at the discretion of the principal.

School Patrols

When the temperature or wind chill is between -27°C and -34°C, patrols will remain on post for 10 minutes. When it is -34°C and below, patrols will remain on post for five minutes. At -40°C and below, no patrols will be on duty.

School Closures

Schools very rarely close due to winter weather.

Winter Clothing

Please ensure that your child comes dressed appropriately for the weather each day. When the temperature or wind chill is between -27°C and -34°C, warm winter clothing is essential, and facial protection is recommended. When it is -34°C and below, facial protection is essential, and it's recommended that children avoid going outdoors unaccompanied—skin will freeze in less than 10 minutes.
