



## HIGH SCHOOL APPRENTICESHIP PROGRAM (HSAP)

Not sure what you're doing after grad? Not into university? Thinking of just working? Consider a trade. A trade offers better pay, makes use of your skills, and gives you pride in a career. There are over 50 trades to choose from. And best of all, you can start your training now, in high school!

So what are your plans after you graduate?

I don't know. I haven't decided yet.

You know, you do have options. If you're not into university, or you're just planning to work after high school, a career in a trade might be right for you.

A trade? What do you mean? Are you talking about a plumber?

A trade is a job that requires a set of specific skills usually acquired through an apprenticeship. A plumber is a trade, but just one of many. There are over 50 trades. Choose the right one for you and you'll be doing what you enjoy, something you're good at, and something you can have a lot of pride in. And it's better pay than just working at some menial job after high school.

I never knew there were so many trades. I should at least have a look. There might be something for me. Ok, so how do I get more information?

Our school offers all the tools you need to get started through a program called HSAP. It stands for High School Apprenticeship Program.

So how does this program work?

You choose your trade, you actually get hands-on training while you're still attending high school...and perhaps best of all, you get paid while learning! The program could even lead to a full-time job right after high school. Not only that, you can earn up to eight credits toward high school graduation.

I might be into this. Getting paid to take a training that leads to a better-paying job...a career I can be proud of. Who do I speak to about it?
