

JT Patrol Update

Even as the temperature drops, our School Safety Patrol squads have been reliably working hard to keep students safe on the way to and from school. As a thank you, all of our JT Patrols were gifted a beautiful neon toque and a few small treats to help keep them safe and warm. Patrols were also treated to a free ticket to a Manitoba Moose Patrol Appreciation event on November 27, 2021





We ask drivers to be mindful of slippery conditions as you are approaching crossings. Thanks for all you do for our School Patrols!

Patrol Weather Guidelines:

With colder weather here, please note the cold weather guidelines below for our patrols. Patrols are trained and reminded to be dressed for the weather as we are on post rain, snow, or shine! Patrols are only off post if there is thunder and lightning, or if the temperature with windchill is below -40C.

Reduced patrol times are implemented for temperatures colder than -27C.

During extremely cold weather, the following guidelines for an abbreviated student patrol schedule will be followed.

Temperature or Windchill:

-27 °C to -34 °C It is recommended that time on post not exceed 10 minutes.

Warm clothing is essential. Facial protection is recommended.

-35 °C to -39 °C It is recommended that time on post not exceed five minutes. Posts located more than a five minute walk from the school will not be patrolled. Warm clothing and facial protection is essential.

-40 °C and below No student patrols on post. The school will notify the students and parents of this abbreviated patrol schedule.

How to Dress: • Scarves, hat, mitts, snowsuit, boots, and other warm clothing. Clothing should not restrict the vision of the patrol.

Thank you to all who participated in our recent Book Fair. It was a great success!



In mid September, we began our IBL (inquiry based learning) classes in the Library. Each class in the school will have the opportunity to work on a small project during their IBL time. HOLIDAYS

TIME TO BUNDLE UP! *RETSD Cold Weather Guidelines*

Sometimes, severe weather requires us to make changes to busing, outdoor recess, and safety patrolling to keep your children safe.

School Closures

Schools very rarely close due to winter weather.

Winter Clothing

Please ensure that your child comes dressed appropriately for the weather each day. When the temperature or wind chill is between -27°C and -34°C, warm winter clothing is essential, and facial protection is recommended. When it is below -34°C, facial protection is essential, and it's recommended that children avoid going outdoors unaccompanied—skin will freeze in less than 10 minutes.

Busing

When the temperature is -35°C and/or wind chill is -45°C or colder at The Forks, metro Winnipeg school divisions (RETSD included) cancel buses for the entire day—but schools usually remain open.

We will post a cancellation alert on the RETSD website home page if buses are cancelled, and alert the media. If we have not posted a cancellation alert by 6:45 a.m., buses are running.

School Patrols

When the temperature or wind chill is between -27°C and -34°C, patrols will remain on post for 10 minutes. When it is -35°C to -39°C, patrols will remain on post for five minutes. When it is -40°C and below, no patrols will be on duty.

Recess

When the temperature or wind chill is between -25°C and -27°C, a shortened recess period may be warranted. When it is below -27°C, recess is usually moved indoors. This is at the discretion of the principal. **with the exception of Polar Bear Club students*



All students will remain inside when the temperature/ windchill is -40°C or below. If you have any questions not addressed by these guidelines, please contact your child's school.

Can my child attend school after returning from travel?

PLEASE NOTE: Public Health continues to recommend against non-essential travel

INTERPROVINCIAL TRAVEL

Fully vaccinated travellers

Asymptomatic, fully vaccinated individuals aged 12 and older do not need to quarantine upon arrival in Manitoba and can attend school.

Children under 12 travelling with fully vaccinated individuals

Children under 12 are not required to quarantine and can attend school if they are asymptomatic and all eligible individuals they are travelling with are fully vaccinated.

Children under 12 travelling with individuals who are not fully vaccinated

If children under 12 are travelling with someone who is eligible but not fully vaccinated, they must quarantine for 14 days upon arrival back in the province.

X) Unvaccinated travellers

Unvaccinated individuals aged 12 and over must quarantine for 14 days upon arrival in Manitoba.

INTERNATIONAL TRAVEL (INCLUDING THE UNITED STATES)

Fully vaccinated travellers

Asymptomatic, fully vaccinated individuals aged 12 and older do not need to quarantine upon arrival in Canada and can attend school.

Children under 12 travelling with fully vaccinated individuals

Unvaccinated children under 12 travelling with fully vaccinated individuals do not need to quarantine, but must follow *enhanced public health measures*, including not attending school or daycare for 14 days upon arrival in Canada.

Children under 12 travelling with individuals who are not fully vaccinated

If children under 12 are travelling with someone who is eligible but not fully vaccinated, they must quarantine for 14 days upon arrival in Canada.

Unvaccinated travellers

Unvaccinated individuals aged 12 and over must quarantine for 14 days upon arrival in Canada.

What Should I Do if My Child is Sick?



Students should stay home from school if they are sick, no matter how mild the symptoms. If your child comes to school with any COVID-19 symptoms, the school will immediately isolate the student and call parents to pick them up.

If students have one symptom from the Column A or two from Column B, they should immediately get tested for COVID-19.

Column A

Do you have a new onset, or worsening, of any ONE of the following symptoms?

- Fever > 38°C or think you have a fever or chills
- Cough
- Sore throat/hoarse voice
- Shortness of breath/breathing difficulties
- Loss of taste or smell
- Vomiting or diarrhea for more than 24 hours

Column B

Do you have a new onset, or worsening, of any TWO of the following symptoms?

- Runny nose
- Muscle aches
- Fatigue
- Conjunctivitis (pink eye)
- Headache
- Skin rash of unknown cause
- Nausea or loss of appetite
- Poor feeding (if an infant)

When Can My Child Return to School?

If your child gets tested for COVID-19 and is:



Negative: They can return to school after 24 hours of being symptom-free.



Positive: Public Health will provide guidance regarding what is required before your child can return to school.

If your child is sick and you decide not to get tested for COVID-19 the student must self-isolate for 10 days from symptom onset plus 24 hours of being symptom-free before returning to school.



When Can Students Attend School?

Generally, students who are well should go to school—"well" means they have no symptoms of COVID-19.

FULLY VACCINATED STUDENTS must stay home if they...

- Are unwell or showing symptoms of COVID-19
- Are waiting for results of a COVID-19 test
- Have tested positive for COVID-19
- Have been directed by Public Health to self-isolate

UNVACCINATED OR PARTIALLY VACCINATED STUDENTS must stay home if they...

- Are unwell or showing symptoms of COVID-19
- Are waiting for results of a COVID-19 test
- Have tested positive for COVID-19
- Have been directed by Public Health to self-isolate
- Are a close contact to a positive COVID-19 case
- Have a household member who has tested positive for COVID-19
- Have travelled outside of the province alone or with unvaccinated or partially vaccinated parents/guardians
- Have a household member who has been identified as a close contact and is now sick with COVID-19 symptoms
- Have a household member who has travelled outside of Manitoba in the last 14 days and is now sick with COVID-19 symptoms*Unless Public Health communicates otherwise to the school principal
