## Touchpebbles author visits Mme Jorgensen's classroom!

On May $14^{\text {th }}$, Touchpebbles and Touchstones co-author, Stephanie Takacs flew up from Michigan to see how we do our Touchpebbles discussions every week in French. Florence Girouard, Director of Educational Support Services from the
Bureau d’Éducation Français translated the program in French for the province of Manitoba, which took 2 years to complete. Touchpebbles is a discussion project aimed for grade 4-6 students and Touchstones is a Discussion project aimed for the grades 7-12 and beyond. Students sit in a circle and do some small
group discussions and then it leads to a class discussion. The teacher reads a fable, legend or philosophical story and then the discussion starts. Students are learning from their friends' perspective and soon realize they all have similar ideas, thoughts and emotions regarding many life experiences. Touchpebbles has brought our class together; they understand each other and their behaviour better now. They have learned that they are no longer alone; they have a voice now and feel they have a place to talk about how they are feeling without being judged by others. The students really enjoy the stories and during our discus-
sions we make connections with the prior ones. Most of the stories, legends and fables have similar morals and values. Since the discussions are in French, students have acquired new vocabulary and can express themselves very well.
