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Did you know that École Regent Park has a student council? Well, we do! This student council is formed of grade 8 students who have support from administration in making decisions and creating fun activities. We also work together to help the school in little and big ways! We'd like to introduce and inform parents/ guardians on what has been going on for the past few weeks.

Let's start off with fruit bowls. We provide each class with a bowl full of nutritious fruit every single week. For example, we supply apples, bananas, oranges, etc... These bowls of fruit are intended for the students who are just needing a little more during school lunch hour and/ or keeping options healthy throughout the day. Over the past couple weeks, we've noticed that these fruits have been benefitting many students in various grades and we will continue to provide these extra snack options. It's not all going to waste though! When our students are done with these fruits, the rest of the fruit (cores, peels, rinds, etc...) go straight to our compost!

This brings us to our compost campaign. It is a program we recently just commenced and has been going wonderfully so far! This program helps the students understand that there are many ways to help the environment, including composting. Every week our student council goes around emptying, cleaning and returning each classes compost bins. The compostable waste then goes into the school's big compost in the courtyard. ÉRP students have decided to utilize the composted soil to put into our upcoming butterfly garden! This way everything is more natural, and we don't have to waste what we can reuse!

To inform you more on our butterfly garden, our grade 8 student council participants will work together with the City of Winnipeg and Living Prairie Museum to install this new garden in early June. We're looking forward to having a program that can help the environment around us! There are several ecological pros that include helping our endangered butterflies. Additionally, we have been growing classroom plants to assist the growth of the garden. The City of Winnipeg kindly donated many little plants to again; help green and beautify the environment around our school.

A few months ago, we decided to bring back frozen yogurt! Covid-19 has certainly made it difficult to have these fun school activities, but as restrictions lifted, we gave it another go! \$3 for one or \$5 for two students can purchase a packaged frozen yogurt twice a month. There are various flavours including cookie dough, Oreo, swirl, etc... The frozen yogurt is ending soon, although we have a new idea for the hot summer days that are approaching! We're selling Freezies! Your children will be able to bring \$2 to school to buy a jumbo Freezie or \$1 for a half!

Band and Music News:

Happy spring everyone! Warmer weather has finally arrived, and the energy it brings is finally reflecting the life and enthusiasm running through the ERP music community. Successes, moments of growth and community events have been plentiful in 2022; those featured below are just some of the incredible moments we have enjoyed.

Our Grade 4 students have had fun rediscovering the ukulele this year. Along with learning how to play chords and strumming along to songs, they were also introduced to playing short melodies as well. During May, everyone engaged in reconciliation through "The Spirit Horse Returns", a professional audio-visual collaboration between Anishinaabe storyteller Jodi Contin, Métis-Ojibwe painter and knowledge keeper Rhonda Snow, Cree composer Andrew Balfour and the Winnipeg Symphony Orchestra. Heading into June, each Grade 4 class is busy preparing sound stories to record and share with family and friends.

The Grade 5 students also returned to ukulele playing and had tons of fun exploring chording and melodies using more advanced techniques. They also got the opportunity to engage in reconciliation through the same "The Spirit Horse Returns Project", expressing their knowledge and understanding through different art mediums. To wrap up the year, each group is combining the skills gained on multiple instruments to put together a final recorded presentation – our song choice shall remain a surprise for now!

The Grade 6 band has seen an incredible amount of progress in a short span of time over the past several months. Moving from single notes, to simple melodies, to playing in harmony on different parts, the change in their playing has been noticeable on a weekly basis. Our efforts were boosted by two full-day clinics at ERP in May, days which were packed full of playing, professional clinician sessions, free food, and plenty of laughter. Each class's final project is to record a section of their first full band piece, which will be combined with those from the other classes in their cohort and edited together to create a complete celebration of their learning.

May was a banner month for the Grade 7 band, whose efforts to improve really started to pay off. Their sense of community was on full display during this month's full-day band retreat at East End Community Center. Clinic sessions with professional musicians, along with the opportunity to rehearse as a full group for the first time, really showed everyone the huge progress they have made, while personal connections were strengthened during breaks and friendly, yet spirited relay races kept the energy high at the end of the day. Two band pieces were recorded during the retreat and will be shared to celebrate their hard work this year.

The Grade 8 band continued to set the bar ever higher for themselves and the entire ERP music community through their constant camaraderie and dedication to improving for the sake of making each other better. Multiple pieces of increasing complexity have constantly pushed mastery of their instruments forward, while the entire group has been challenged to create our own unified, unique artistic interpretation of each work, rather than having a teacher decide this element. At the beginning of May, the band was "surprised" (some of them, anyways!) by a visit from Mme Nowostawski, who had a blast acting as a guest conductor for the day. Three pieces are being recorded to share with the ERP community as a final celebration of their incredible band journey together as musicians, as teammates, and most importantly, as friends.

There was excitement aplenty when the Grade 8 Jazz Band was able to start rehearsing again for the first time in two years! Our lunch time meetings have been filled with hard work mixed with laughter as we rediscovered how to play a variety of styles of music, including swing, Latin and soul. Improvisation, singing, and marching all made regular appearances to push everyone to expand their comfort zone and take more risks in a safe environment together. The final plans to celebrate this ensemble's journey are in progress and will be shared when finalized, of which recordings demonstrating their growth and talents will form a major part.



Design & Industrial Arts News:

This year we had our first ever Industrial Arts Design class at ERP. Within our Mac Lab, students have learned fundamental steps toward technological competency & fluency, while incorporating elements of designing and planning their own different projects.

Our Grade 8 students have been introduced to 3D modeling and printing, audio engineering (that's the fancy way for saying 'creating awesome music and soundscapes in Garage Band' (2), and digital cartography & storytelling. Students are currently being introduced to coding and computer science, learning to design their own video games in the software Scratch.

There have been some fantastic creations made in our class this year. I would love to highlight the student's eagerness to learn, determination when facing challenges, and utilizing problem-solving capabilities when encountering these obstacles.

To end the year, students are tasked to apply their knowledge towards a design related project of their choosing, using any of the software and techniques that we have previously learned. There are sure to be some great ideas and creations flowing out of the Mac Lab, and we look forward to seeing the final product!

All classes and grades have been an absolute pleasure this year, and I cannot wait to see what other cool stuff is made within our Mac Lab!

Our Grade 4s must finally draft their school's core values and create a "code de vie" for their students to abide by. Students have really been enjoying this project and we are very excited to see how their schools turn out!

A message from the Canadian Centre for Child Protection:



Our agency, **Canadian Centre for Child Protection** has been connecting regularly with schools and parents about their online safety concerns. In a recent survey of nearly 2,000 parents and caregivers, parents said that their top concerns about their children being online were*:

- 1. Their child sharing too much personal information online
- 1. Not knowing who their child is connecting with online

*Survey of nearly 2,000 parents/caregivers during live Canadian Centre for Child Protection online safety sessions in 2021/22.

Recognizing a need for current and concise information on this issue, C3P has developed a new video, **Online Risks and Trends**, that provides parents, caregivers, and other adults around children with information to build capacity to safeguard children and youth from online harms.

In preparation for summer, we have also stocked up on our free parent brochures, such as **Parenting Tweens and Teens in the Digital World** and our **ProtectKidsOnline.ca Parent Postcard** which can be provided to parents and caregivers, as well as **activity books** and **comics** for students that can be used to help parents continue safety conversations. There is no cost for these resources, and C3P will cover the cost of shipping.
