FRENCH IMMERSION NEWS



Artisanat

On December 21st all French Immersion students are participating in a teambuilding afternoon of holiday craft activities. Our FI program calls this afternoon 'Artisanat'. Students will be placed in multi-age groups and participate in two different activities. Moments like this give us an opportunity to see students engage in a social activity that involves French conversation in an authentic setting of cultural enjoyment. Students are not only encouraged to use their French among their peers but to also act as leaders in helping the younger students understand the craft activity and practice their French. Artisanat provides us with an authentic French language setting among peers without the stress of schoolwork getting in the way. The activities include building and decorating a gingerbread house, baking cookies, developing a

computer-animated story and creating holiday cards.

Student Exchange Opportunities

On November 28th, the organization OSEF sent a representative to give a brief presentation regarding a France/Canada summer or school-year exchange trip. Students aged 13-17 are eligible to apply. There are two options for an exchange: the summer program or the nine and 11-week programs.



The summer program involves being paired with a student from France and living with their family in France for the month of July. In August, the student from France would come to Canada to live with our student for the month of August.

The nine and 11-week exchange is when the Canadian student moves to France to live with the French family and attends school from February to the end of April. The French student will then come to Canada from mid-August to the beginning of November and also attends school.

MARLY (Manitoba Association for Rights and Liberties - Youth)

What is the Youth Leadership in Social Justice Program at Munroe?

The Manitoba Association for Rights and Liberties, with the generous support of the Winnipeg Foundation, has developed a *Youth Leadership in Social Justice Program*. This program is a workshop series which provides our Munroe students with a forum to create projects to improve their communities. This organization guides the teachers and students through the process by providing them with the necessary tools to develop leadership skills in the area of social justice and beyond.

In the past two years of running, this program has worked with 21 schools, more than 180 students, and seen the completion of 19 projects. The creativity, passion and work ethic of the students is amazing!

This November our MARLY student group presented ARTICLE 25 of the UDHR (see below) at the University of Saint-Boniface to other student groups to bring awareness to the condition that many people in Canada face such as unsanitary living conditions, ineffective access to water and inadequate health care.

Article 25 states:

(1) Everyone has the right to a standard of living adequate for the health and well-being of himself and of his family, including food, clothing, housing, medical care and necessary social services, and the right to security in the event of unemployment, sickness, disability, widowhood, old age or other lack of livelihood in circumstances beyond his control.

2) Motherhood and childhood are entitled to special care and assistance. All children, whether born in or out of wedlock, shall enjoy the same social protection.

We were also part of an all-day workshop dealing with the sensitive but very prevalent subject of Canadian child exploitation as seen through the eyes of a survivor.

We were also very proud to be a part of the Remembrance Day Service for our school. Without these dedicated men and women fighting for our right to freedom, Canada might not be the democratic country we are so fortunate to live in today.

We will be working throughout the year to partner with various social service programs in the community and look forward to keeping you updated.

NEWS FROM THE GYM

It is an exciting and busy time for the Munroe Stingers!

Volleyball season has wrapped up. Each member of the volleyball teams should be congratulated for their commitment to their teams.

Basketball tryouts are starting up already in December. Students who want to be part of a team should listen for announcements for when tryouts will be held.

December 3rd marked UNESCO's International Day for Persons with Disabilities. In the weeks of November 28th to December 9th, students participated in a 'Games for Persons with Disabilities' unit in their PE classes; the theme of this unit is 'No excuses! Overcome your limitations!'. Students examined how persons with disabilities overcome their daily challenges using an attitude of "I can". They also participated in numerous sports designed for people with physical disabilities, including wheelchair basketball, wheelchair rugby, goal ball, blind obstacle course and sledge hockey. Students have also discussed the opportunities for people with disabilities in Canada (as compared to developing countries) and examined the issue of human rights as it relates to people with disabilities. In the PE unit, students have had presentations made by Manitoba's Wheelchair Sport Association (wheelchair athlete Alex McLean will share his experiences), Manitoba Sledge Hockey Association and Special Olympics (intellectual disability in sport). Students have had opportunities to participate in wheelchair basketball, goal ball (a game for persons who are blind), sledge hockey (for wheelchair athletes), a blind obstacle course, and other games that explore what it is like to play sports with a physical or intellectual disability.

This has been a great opportunity for students to not only have a lot of fun, but to gain perspective and put themselves in someone else's (gym) shoes!
